

## GILMORTON CHANDLER CE PRIMARY SCHOOL – PUPIL PREMIUM WEBSITE STATEMENT

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools for children who are currently known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM), those known to have been eligible in the last six years, children of service families and children who are or who have been in local authority care. It was introduced in April 2011 and is intended to narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers.

In the **2017 to 2018** financial year, schools receive the following funding for each child registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years:

- £1320 for pupils in reception year to year 6

Schools also receive £1900 for each pupil who has left local-authority care because of 1 of the following:

- Adoption, a special guardianship order, a child arrangements order, a residence order

Children who have been in local-authority care for one day or more also attract £1,900 of pupil premium funding. Funding for these pupils doesn't go to their school; it goes to the virtual school head (VSH) in the local authority that looks after the child. VSHs are responsible for managing pupil premium funding for looked-after children.

Schools receive £300 for children recorded as service children from the Ministry of Defence.

Our total funding through the Pupil Premium for the financial year 2017-18 is expected to be **£15080**. We will use the funding to provide one-to-one or small group tuition by a qualified teacher, to provide additional teaching assistant or tutor support and to support qualifying families with the purchase of uniform, school site childcare, enrichment and residential opportunities.

Currently, the majority of pupils attending Gilmorton Chandler who are entitled to the Pupil Premium are working in line with age related expectations (ARE) in the core areas of reading, writing, communication and mathematics. Where they are not, it is related to special educational needs. Additionally, the vast majority have made at least expected progress from their starting points.

The funding last year totalled £11280. This was spent as follows:
